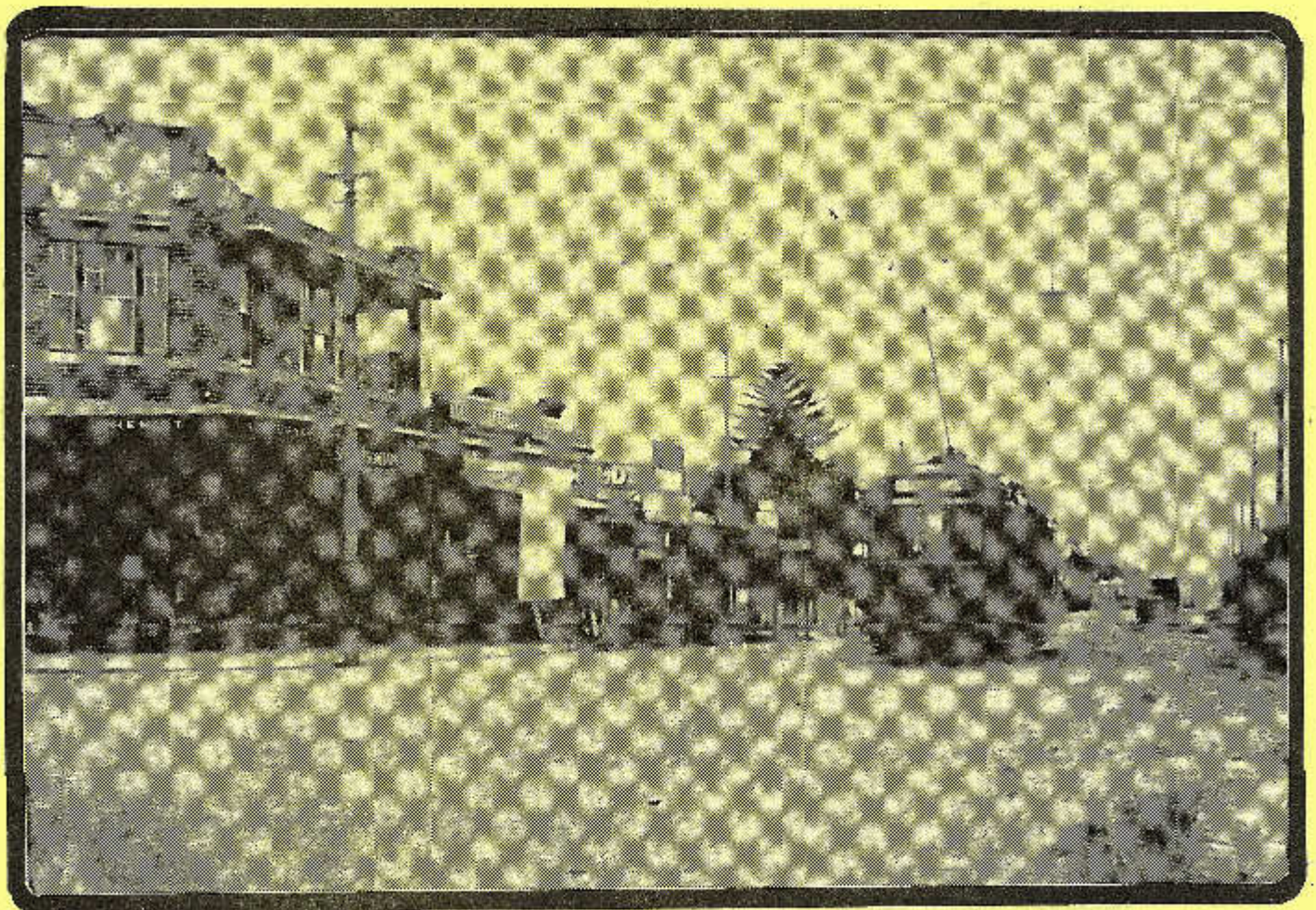

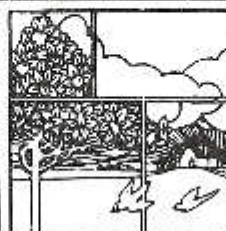

PLANS FOR 150th ANNIVERSARY

Time is running along towards the 150th anniversary of white settlement in Victoria, with the designated anniversary period scheduled from November 1984—November 1985.

At this time, many local planning committees have been established, including the municipalities within the BURWOOD BULLETIN distribution area. These are currently deciding on priorities and programmes and are looking for support amongst local residents.

IN THE CITY OF BOX HILL, four proposals — amongst other possibilities — are being developed. These are:

... The publication of a pictorial history of Box Hill. Present and former residents are being asked NOW to contribute photographs, postcards, diaries, letters or memorabilia to make this publication possible.

... The Opening of a Mall in Box Hill.

... The retrieval of a "time-capsule" placed under the foundation stone of the Box Hill Town Hall when it was laid on April 15, 1935.

The casket buried under the foundation stone records the names of more than 3000 people, mainly Box Hill and Nunawading school children, and those whose names were listed will be invited to an "unveiling" on April 15, 1985.

... A re-enactment of the Box Hill Artists' Camp, made famous by such painters as Tom Roberts, Frederick McCubbin and later Arthur Streeton and Louis Abraham, will mark the 100th anniversary of its establishment as well as Victoria's 150th birthday celebrations. A number of community activities are being planned around this site.

IN THE CITY OF CAMBERWELL, the local committee for the 150th anniversary celebrations is aiming to establish commemorative events on a monthly basis.

These would include a number of major events already established on the Camberwell community calendar including the Rotary Art Show, the May Festival and various musical events... these to be linked where possible with anniversary themes.



"Children's Are Vital" will be the theme of Children's Week this year. Families, schools, and community groups are reminded to watch for news of events being planned — or to plan their own activities for the Week.

CHILDREN'S WEEK — OCTOBER 23-30

Other month-by-month activities being considered would include sporting events, arts, craft and ethnic activities, a Heritage Ball and a Grand Parade Finale.

The effectiveness of such a programme will depend to a very large extent on community involvement and the committee is now in process of extending its contacts with service clubs, sporting and community groups to seek their support.

IN THE CITY OF NUNAWADING, 150th anniversary ideas "in the melting pot" include the building of a Community Arts Centre behind the Civic Centre — a project being encouraged by the Mitcham Arts Association, a Colonial Ball under the auspices of the Nunawading Arts Council and the granting of the Freedom of the City to the locally-based 4/19th Light Horse Regiment at the 1985 Australia Day celebrations.

ORANA HOUSING PROJECT

The recent announcement that the Ministry of Housing had purchased 8.7 hectares of ORANA land in Elgar Road adjoining Wattle Park can be seen as an important step to the future in two respects:

- in the provision of low-cost rental housing to meet an urgent community need;
- in offering a new opportunity for the children at the ORANA Peace Memorial Homes to enjoy upgraded facilities and to live in a wider residential environment.

Plans for this new venture have been under public discussion in recent weeks. As with all such innovations, there have been some mixed — though mainly favourable — reactions. Further neighbourhood discussions are expected as the planning continues.

A steering committee, with ORANA and Ministry representatives, has been established to oversee this development from start to finish. Its members will provide a breadth of experience and expertise which will ensure that progress over the next five years will take account of relevant needs and the expectations of residents on the site as well as the surrounding neighbourhood.

R.A.P.I.D. DEVELOPMENTS

The Residential Association for People with Intellectual Disabilities (R.A.P.I.D.) was formed towards the end of last year and includes a wide range of people within the Inner Eastern Region community interested in assisting intellectually-disabled people to find suitable accommodation.

The group took over the management of a house in May Street, Doncaster East from July 1 to provide temporary residence for multiply handicapped persons. This house was the responsibility of the ONEMDA Day Training Centre from March of this year and cared for 22 persons prior to its transfer to R.A.P.I.D., the long-term aim of which will be to take responsibility for all housing and accommodation schemes in the Inner Eastern Region funded by the Mental Retardation Division.

The group seeks to provide a variety of living arrangements to meet individual needs and a homelike environment with as many normal living experiences as possible.

Plans are in hand for the establishment of two long-stay houses for moderately to severely intellectually-disabled children and adults and an independent training unit for four mildly intellectually disabled adults.

The first permanent-care residence in Box Hill for moderately to severely intellectually disabled adults will be announced shortly.

The residence will emulate, as closely as possible, a normal home. It will offer care and support to enable the five residents to enjoy independence as far as they are able and to develop durable relationships.

Obviously, this step will only fill a small part of the need for such accommodation in the Inner Eastern Region.

COMMUNITY HELP NEEDED

R.A.P.I.D. projects are in line with Government policy of integrating disabled people with the general community and subsidies have been provided by the Health Commission, particularly the Mental Retardation Division, allowing for the employment of resident staff. No allowances are available for administrative and support staff.

Community help is needed to provide funding for at least a part-time Executive Officer and for support services that will ensure the smooth running of family-style care for people whose needs are too often ignored or who would otherwise have to spend their days in large institutions.

INTERCHANGE (INNER EAST) HOST FAMILIES FOR DISABLED CHILDREN

INTERCHANGE, a community-based support scheme for families of disabled children, is now entering its third year of operation.

Its success is evidenced by the 46 families who have been compatibly matched but there are many more disabled children and their families who could benefit from the programme if extra host families can be found.

Once a host family has volunteered to take part in this family interchange, the family is invited to attend five two-hourly training sessions which focus on the way INTERCHANGE works, the efforts of disability on a family, specific aspects of various handicaps and how to care for a child so disabled.

At this time, potential host families are asked to consider what age child, and what kind of disability, would best fit into their family and home structure. The co-ordinators make every effort to realise these factors in the matching process.

Once the child is matched to his "host", then the two families involved decide when and how the care will be provided. This normally takes the form of overnight or week-end stays each four or five weeks. Back-up support from the co-ordinators is always available to both families.

WAVERLEY COMMUNITY

LEARNING CENTRE



The Waverley Community Learning Centre is located at 3 Fleet Street, Mount Waverley (next to the reservoir behind the Shell Service Station — Melway Directory 61 G12).

The Centre is a local community project developed for the purpose of bringing people together to share skills acquired in the process of living and to learn new skills and developing self-esteem.

This style of learning offers a supportive and caring atmosphere in which participation and decision-making are encouraged.

Members of the Centre get together in many ways. The teachers share their skills and talents and enjoy being involved in helping others. Those attending the classes enjoy learning plus meeting others and making new friends. The office is run efficiently by volunteers who answer the telephone, collect fees and welcome people to the Centre, which is managed overall by a dedicated Committee.

Classes at the Centre include:

Art & Craft: Oil painting, pottery, macramé, crochet, leatherwork, leadlighting, canvas needlepoint work and dressmaking. Pottery for children is held on Fridays after school.

Keep Fit & Relaxation: Keep Fit, Yoga and Tai Chi Chuan exercises.

Language Classes: Basic & advanced English, Italian, French, Spanish, Chinese (Mandarin).

One day and half-day workshops are also available on such topics as interior decorating, Christmas crafts and gift wrapping.

There is a creche available for those attending classes, where babies and children are cared-for by capable babysitters.

SERVICES TO HELP DISABLED

A WAY OF HELPING THE BLIND

Ms Joan Ryan, Secretary of the Australian Guild of Business and Professional Blind, and a resident of Burwood, is seeking the help of volunteers to transcribe books into braille.

Volunteers need to spend about six to eight weeks learning braille so they will be able to operate the transcription machine. In essence, this is a similar operation to copy-typing.

To acquire this skill could be of interest to a volunteer and help to extend the range of reading interests and needs of the individual blind person.

TWO-WAY BENEFITS

This interchange provides positive rewards for both participating families. The disabled child has the opportunity for social interaction and experiences beyond his/her often limited environment. The child's parents enjoy support and relief from the constant demands of a handicapped youngster, allowing time for other siblings and other interests. The host families gain valuable insights into disablement problems.

INTERCHANGE RESOURCES

The co-ordinators of INTERCHANGE are Fiona Lindsay and Carol Mathew, both trained social workers with wide experience in community and in health programmes. A recruitment project officer and a clerical assistant have recently been added to the staff, thanks to funding through the Employment Initiatives Scheme.

SEEKING CHILD CARE SUPPORT VOLUNTEERS IN BOX HILL

The Family Life Programme of the State Government, to provide occasional and emergency child care, has been operating for about twelve months. Through this programme, child care is provided in a network of private homes and the Child Care Officer in the City of Box Hill, Neil Lewis, is seeking to recruit volunteers in the municipality to support the home care mothers who look after other people's children on a full or part-time basis.

She says: "Child care at home can be an isolating job. As the service grows, I am unable to visit care givers as often as I would like. I am looking for mature volunteers, preferably experienced with children, to give the home care mothers an opportunity to discuss with others the satisfactions and problems encountered with the children and parents."

This volunteer task would involve visiting up to four day care mothers for one or two hours at least once a month at a mutually-convenient time. Such visits would offer an opportunity for the day-care mothers to discuss all or any aspects of their work on a confidential basis. The support volunteer might also encourage them to contact the child care project officer if any difficulty seemed to be developing either with the children or parents concerned.

They would also be asked to attend an informal monthly meeting with other supporters and the child care project officer.

FACS

Family and Community Services

FACTS

The Family and Community Services (FACS) Programme can help to turn good community ideas into action. It is the means of giving support to local, regional and State-wide groups which encourage resident initiatives and self-help in meeting family and community needs.

FACS operates under the auspices of the Department of Community Welfare Services, through a series of eighteen Regional Consultative Councils throughout the State.

The FACS funding grants which are administered through the agency of the Regional Consultative Councils (RCC) are intended to provide relatively small sums to local voluntary and self-help groups unlikely to be eligible for other grants or subsidy schemes.

The Government is thus involved in a co-operative form of social planning, tapping in to local-level resources and initiatives and, in turn, offering the means to set such good ideas in train in the community.

THE INNER EASTERN REGION

The membership of a Regional Consultative Council may vary from region to region, within set guidelines. The Inner Eastern Region RCC covers the municipalities of Box Hill, Camberwell, Doncaster/Templestowe, Hawthorn, Kew and Waverley.

Two members of the RCC are appointed by each of these municipal councils and two members elected from each of the local consultative committees established by these Councils to advise on local priorities and programmes. Representatives of relevant Government Departments are also nominated to the RCC and there are four places for the election of citizen representatives, for which any adult member of the community may vote or may nominate.

In addition to the members mentioned above, a Chairman is appointed by the Minister of Community Welfare Services on the recommendation of the RCC. The Department provides each region with a FACS team including a stenographer/receptionist, a community welfare officer involved with self-help groups and a social administrative officer (SAO) to act as a secretary and resources person for the RCC.

The SAO prepares discussion papers and reports relating to social policy and planning within the area, provides precis and regional perspectives on Government policy papers and negotiates with municipal welfare staff in joint initiatives with other Councils.

The SAO also provides RCC with information on how organisations are handling existing FACS-funded programmes and recommends funding levels.

The RCC advertises a new round of FACS funding each August. The applications are considered by the RCC Grants Allocation Committee, which seeks to integrate the priority recommendations of the local consultative committees with the applications and needs of the organisations providing services in each municipality. The RCC sends its recommended priority order to the Minister for a final decision. It could be noted that the level of funding available does not always mesh with the applications received and there can be disappointments.

NEW CHAIRMAN APPOINTED

The recently appointed Chairman of the Inner Eastern RCC is Cr. Betty Walters, Mayor of Box Hill, who has succeeded Cr. Dorothy Laver of Camberwell Council. Cr. Walters has represented the City of Box Hill on the RCC since 1979.

BURWOOD CEMETERY EVOKES HISTORIC MEMORIES

After attending a funeral in Melbourne on a very wet day in 1857, several Burwood residents decided that what was desperately needed in their flourishing township was a cemetery of their own.

These residents applied for permission from the Government and a public meeting was held on December 14, 1857 in the schoolroom at Damper Creek, with Mr Savidge as chairman.

Trustees representing the various denominations were chosen at this meeting. They were Mr John Lowry for the Episcopalians, Mr David Houston, Presbyterians, Mr Richard Barry, Independents, Mr John Little, Wesleyans, Mr William Blanksley, Primitive Methodists, Mr William Ollingsworth, Wesleyan Association and Father William Dempsey, Roman Catholics.

The original cemetery covered an area of five acres cornered by Highbury Road and Gilmour Street. That is approximately one-third of the existing site. In 1935, the cemetery extended along Highbury Road and, later that year, along Gilmour Street. In 1937 the area was extended further along to Evans Street.

Many local residents have been associated with the Cemetery Trust since that first meeting in 1857. Mr Neil Harrison, who died in office as a Trustee on May 14 this year, had

continued a family tradition of involvement with the Trust spanning more than one hundred years. His grandfather, John Harrison, was a Trustee in the late 1800s and early 1900s.

MINUTES SHED LIGHT ON EARLY BURWOOD

The minutes of the Trustee meetings make interesting reading and shed light on the life and times of early Burwood.

At the meeting on April 1, 1899, with Mr Edward Fisher as chairman and Messrs Harrison and Cooper present, a letter was received from Mrs Bower of Hawthorn stating that the rail and stone on her husband's grave had been broken, probably by a horse grazing at the grave site.

The Trustees wrote to Mrs Bower saying that no horses were allowed into the cemetery except when conveying monuments to be erected. However, the letter stated, it had been ascertained that Messrs Chambers and Clutton had lately erected a monument to the late Andrew Futton and that the horse had got loose while the work was being done. It was the only thing which could account for the damage, the letter continued. Messrs Chambers and Clutton were asked to repair the grave and Mrs Bower was advised that these steps had been taken.

BURIAL RECORDS

From the burial records, it is notable that a significant number of stillborn babies and infants were buried before the turn of the century. Up to December, 1982, 25,374 burials were recorded and only the first burial remains a mystery. That was recorded on October 27, 1858 and five shillings was paid for the grave. Unfortunately the early records do not specify exactly where the person was buried!

According to the present Secretary of Trustees, Mr John Morkham, many plots were bought, particularly in 1916 and 1917, but never used.

The cemetery was officially closed on April 27, 1982. Since then a number of unused graves have been located and Mr Morkham estimates that these remaining 149 sites will have been sold within the next ten years or so.

According to law, a cemetery is kept for fifty years after the last burial which, Mr Morkham estimates, could be in the year 2009. That means, allowing for no changes in legislation, the Burwood Cemetery will return to public recreation about the year 2059.

This would end a 200-year history as one of Burwood's historic landmarks.

BURWOOD GENERATIONS

John and Naomi Hill and their five sons came to Australia in 1841 and were early settlers in this district with land along Boundary (Warrigal) Road near Norwood (Toorak) Road.

Both John and Naomi were buried in the Burwood Cemetery, as were their son Henry and his wife and their son Albert and his wife.

Albert had a market garden extending from what is now Outlook Drive back to what is now Oxford Street and his neighbours were market gardeners, flower growers and a poultry farmer.

His children attended Canterbury Primary School. They walked across open paddocks and crossed a creek to get there, except when it rained when they were transported in the family horse and buggy.

The surviving members of Albert Hill's family are Adeline and Ernest. Adeline now lives in Munro Avenue, Ashburton and Ernest in Nerissa Street, Burwood.

Letters

NEARLY 90 YEARS OF BURWOOD MEMORIES

The photograph of the Mechanics' Institute on the front cover of the last issue revived memories for many Burwood identities.

These included Mrs M. Charman, now in her ninetieth year, who has written about her long association with the district. This began in 1895 when, as an eighteen months-old toddler, she came with her parents to Frog Farm on the corner of Canterbury (now Cromwell) Street and the Highway.

The two-acre farm was known as Frog Farm, Mrs Charman says, because frogs abounded along the creek which ran through the property.

Although Mrs Charman spent her school days in Burnley, she returned to Burwood in 1916, to the first house built in Jervis Street. Most of the surroundings were still open paddocks and Through Road was a dirt track with a creek running across it. Aisbett's poultry farm was adjacent and there was a training track at the top of the hill.

In 1921 Mrs Charman was married at St. Faith's Anglican Church and her reception was held at the Burwood Mechanics' Institute.

Her late husband, who was well known as a member of the Camberwell Council Staff for 35 years, was also a trainer at the Burwood Football Club for a number of years, and two of their sons were members of the Burwood Tennis Club. Her late brother was a member of the Bowling Club and his widow continues as a member. There has been a family tradition of community and sporting activity.

Mrs Charman continued to live in Jervis Street until 1971 when she sold the property and moved to a unit in Middleborough Road, Burwood. Though there are still many people in the district who can remember Burwood in its more rural days, few could match Mrs Charman's long memories of the transition from market gardens to busy suburban centre. Thank you for your letter, Mrs Charman.

TALKIES IN BURWOOD?

Mr A. T. Mitchell, of Muriel Street, Burwood has written to express interest in the history of the Burwood Mechanics' Institute.

"I remember attending a wedding reception in the building in 1925", Mr Mitchell said, "The bride was a Miss Burrell whose mother and other members of the family lived in Queen's Parade, in the house next to the present Scout Hall."

"My wife and I came to live in Muriel Street in 1938 but I do not remember 'talkies' in the Hall then", he added. "Perhaps they disappeared when the Regal Theatre was built at Hartwell. Some of your readers may know when that happened".

HOUSING FOR THE ELDERLY IN ASHBURTON

Camberwell Council recently purchased a block of land at the corner of High Street and Stocks Avenue, well-known to local people as the Dairy land.

It has been decided that up to ten units could be erected at the rear of the site, facing Stocks Avenue, and that the most appropriate means of constructing these seems to be a scheme made available by the Ministry of Housing, whereby the Ministry would bear all the construction and development costs provided the site is either given or leased to it by the Council.

These proposed units would be available for rental. The units would be designed by private architects, but the control of letting of the units could be delegated to the Council or a local committee.

If the Council offers to lease the land to the Ministry of Housing, and the Ministry agrees to this arrangement, it may be possible to have the units completed within twelve to fifteen months.

The remainder of the allotment contains the dairy building and the dwelling which face High Street, the future of which is now being considered by the Council.

There is a tremendous shortage of suitable low cost housing for the elderly in the South Ward, as elsewhere, and even a small number of units could make life more comfortable for some.



The Ashburton Senior Citizen's Welfare Association is very interested in housing for the elderly in the area and drew Council's attention to the need some months ago. They set out to do something about it, but because of the lack of available land in the South Ward, were unable to proceed with their original proposals and are very interested in the present plan.
