

A dedicated group of senior walkers from Burwood Brickworks in Melbourne's inner-east has stepped up in a big way for this year's Walk for Autism, raising thousands of dollars and inspiring others with their community spirit.

Led by local personal trainer and group fitness instructor Chrissy Dunienville, the group comes together twice a week at Burwood Brickworks Shopping Centre for a one-hour walking and exercise session at the centre, who generously support the initiative by offering it free to the community. The group averages around 50 participants per session, and this year many members eagerly took on the Walk for Autism challenge, clocking up their steps and rallying donations throughout May.

Chrissy said the initiative has sparked important conversations. "One group member shared that just by participating in this fundraising activity, they discovered autism in a few families, which they were not aware of. There is a hope among our group that the stigma about autism can be eradicated so that we can all live in a more inclusive and understanding society".

Walk for Autism is Aspect's major annual fundraiser, with thousands of Australians walking 7000 steps a day to support the one in 40 Australians who are Autistic. The event highlights the mental health challenges faced by 70% of Autistic people, challenges that stem not from autism itself but from a world that is often not autismfriendly.

Dr Vicki Gibbs, Head of Research at Aspect, said Walk for Autism is a powerful way to highlight these urgent challenges and create change. "A world that isn't designed for Autistic people makes everyday life more difficult and contributes to these struggles. We need to change that," said Dr Gibbs.

"At Aspect, we're actively working to create a more inclusive society. Our Autism Friendly Team collaborates with businesses, transport hubs, venues and public spaces across Australia, offering expert guidance to help make environments more accessible. Education is key, because understanding fosters empathy, acceptance and real change".

Dr Gibbs encourages everyone to support this initiative: "An autism-friendly world benefits us all. Embracing diverse perspectives supports innovation and growth, and many accommodations that support Autistic people can improve experiences for everyone".

Contemporary mosaic artists offer a shared vision of hope

N exhibition is shining a fresh light on an oftenoverlooked art form, mosaic. We Share the Same Moon unites three acclaimed artists: Barb Uhlenbruch (Melbourne), Rachel Bremner (Tasmania) and Kate Butler (Bungendore, NSW) in a striking exploration of connection, nature and renewal.

While mosaic is frequently associated with birdbaths or decorative craft, these artists elevate the medium into the realm of contemporary fine art. Their works blend the painter's eye for colour and form, the sculptor's sense of space and surface, and the collage-maker's use of layered meaning, all rendered in stone, glass and salvaged fragments.

The exhibition takes its title from a unifying idea: that even amid uncertainty and division, we all share the same sky. In times marked by climate stress, isolation and fatigue, these works offer quiet, powerful reflections on the fragility and resilience of the human spirit.

"For me, mosaic is the medium I turn to for expressing abstract concepts," says Barb Uhlenbruch. "The slow and tactile nature of the work opens meaningful space for processing thoughts and feelings and manifesting their artistic expression. No medium does that for me in quite the same way".



We Share the Same Moon

Rachel Bremner's work draws on her deep relationship with nature, using foraged materials to create improvisational mosaics that emerge organically.

"Mosaic making for me is like a meditation," she says.

"Each work is entirely improvised, driven by materials and process with no plan in my mind, which takes me to a place of intense concentration and calm. When a piece is finished I am often surprised to see magical things I wasn't expecting".

Kate Butler transforms discarded building remnants into textured wall reliefs, exploring the layered stories between people and the environments they shape and are shaped by.

"Touching and shaping each piece of stone is to be reminded that I'm holding time. When cleaving or cutting it, I'm never sure what I might find. Fossils and knots of mica reveal themselves amidst iridescent streaks harbouring deep time secrets. The abundance of embedded memories, be they geological or cultural, allows me to create layers of meaning in a work".


Together, the three artists challenge expectations of what mosaic can be. Through improvisation, patience and storytelling, they reshape stone and memory into something bold and alive.

As far as beauty in suburbia goes, you would be hard pressed to find a more pleasing attraction than Gardiners Creek and its environs.

Meandering through Melbourne's inner southeast, the waterway is flanked by bush, parkland and sporting fields, bringing great amenity and enjoyment for residents.

However, this is all under threat because of the plan to force high-rise densification on local communities without consultation.

Under potentially destructive planning changes, the government wants to allow towers of up to 20 storeys to be built in 50 high-density, or so-called "activity zones" across the city.

This spells disaster for the environmentallysensitive Gardiners Creek corridor, because massive development will be given the green light within 800 metres of Gardiner, Glen Iris, Darling, East Malvern and Holmesglen railway stations.

Also affected is an area within 400 metres of the nearby Ashburton station.

Several other precincts in the cities of Boroondara and Monash, including around Camberwell, Tooronga and Holmesglen stations, also face the prospect of overdevelopment.

Homeowners who have worked hard to build a life for their families in highly liveable suburbs do not deserve to be punished with densification that threatens the natural environment and built heritage.

Its plan will endanger the "leafy" nature of our south-eastern suburbs through a reduction of the tree canopy as existing homes are demolished to make way for high-rise flats.



Opinion piece: High zones

In addition to the ugly towers that will spring up everywhere, the planning changes will allow three- to six-storey projects in all remaining areas of Boroondara and Monash.

This means "cookie-cutter" style development, where design is not scrutinised and building coverage is allowed for almost the whole block, causing a significant heat island effect.

In coming years the plan seeks to nearly double the number of houses and apartments in Boroondara and Monash, meaning the addition of more than 130,000 dwellings in these areas.

To make matters worse, no plan has been announced for extra services such as health, schools or open space to support the proposed massive increase in population.

It is telling that even a state government statutory body, Heritage Council Victoria (HCV), expressed concern about the plans in a considered submission to a Parliamentary inquiry into planning amendments VC257, VC267 and VC274.

HCV slammed the lack of consultation and questioned if "heritage fabric and the heritage setting of places of state significance and local significance will be assessed".

In another submission, Royal Historical Society of Victoria (RHSV) warned that the impact on heritage would have a negative impact on the quality of the environment.

RHSV said that large-scale demolishing and rebuilding housing carried enormous costs including wasted energy, landfill waste, "as well as the loss of cultural value of heritage".

Once this heritage is lost it is lost forever.

The Parliamentary inquiry, which I initiated, was given little convincing evidence that the government's plan would guarantee more housing, and there was no substantial evidence that it would with certainty create additional affordable homes.

There are solutions to the housing crisis without the need to threaten the liveability of prized areas such as Glen Iris, Ashburton and East Malvern.

One example is to develop the former defence site at Maribyrnong, currently owned by the federal government. This 128-ha site could accommodate thousands of homes.

It is therefore crucial for communities to mobilise against this outrageous intrusion into their lives and help stop the changes before it's too late.

Whitehorse Gem Show

THE Nunawading and District Lapidary Club is a hive of activity, with members coming and going throughout the week to work on their creations – cutting gemstones, polishing them into cabochons (a smooth domed shape), faceting them so that they sparkle from all angles and even working with metals to make jewellery.

The club was formed in 1969 and has had a strong membership throughout their time. Back then, workshops were done in members' basements, until a council grant enabled the club to build their own rooms on Silver Grove, near the Nunawading railway station. In 2021, the club moved into their purpose-built rooms located within the Nunawading Community Hub on Springvale Road.


While lapidary is an individualised activity, there's a real sense of camaraderie as members chat, look over each others' shoulders to see what they're doing and marvel at all the shiny pretty treasures before them. Along with the spacious and well-equipped rooms, it's easy to understand why members often stay for hours each time.

I was given a tour of the club by Phil Toland, who is a self-confessed rock hound. When he was seven years old, Phil found a piece of green jasper, which enchanted him and piqued his interest in gems. At around 33 years old, Phil borrowed some lapidary equipment. Through reading books long into the night, he started to teach himself faceting. Soon after, he was hooked and bought a faceting machine and hasn't stopped since. His interest in gems has also influenced family holiday destinations, including travelling to New Zealand to find jade for his collection.

Currently the club has almost 300 members and most are amateurs with a keen passion for gems, minerals and fossils. The club welcomes new members, including young ones. They have a junior club that is open to children 12 years and over. If you're a beginner, never fear, the club provides raw materials and training to new members on how to cut and polish gems and make jewellery.

The club plans regular field trips so that members can find buried treasure. I was surprised to discover that there are gems just lying there in a creek or riverbed, waiting to be found. The regulations are that you must have a fossicker's licence and use hand tools to excavate the gemstones.

The club is having a Gem Show on 18-19 October. Having had the privilege of seeing the club rooms and their members at work, I highly recommend coming to the show. There will be sales and displays of rough and finished gems, minerals, jewellery and fossils; jewellery competition; tours and demonstrations; lucky dip and a raffle; and refreshments. World Sight Day



EACH year in October, the global community pauses to focus on something many of us take for granted, our vision. World Sight Day, happening this year on October 9, is more than just a day on the calendar. It's an eye opener – a powerful call to action to raise awareness about preventable blindness, encourage regular eye check-ups, and to advocate for universal access to eye care.

With over 13 million Australians living with one or more chronic eye conditions and 90% of global vision loss being preventable or treatable, this is an issue that touches nearly every home and heart. In older Australians, chronic eye conditions are especially common, affecting 93% of people over 65. Females experience a higher prevalence of chronic eye conditions than males (59% and 51% respectively).

What steps you should take on World Sight Day?

This year, the message goes further. In 2024, the International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness (IAPB) ran a global campaign focusing on children's eye health, highlighting how untreated vision issues can result in millions of years of lost education. Early intervention – like a simple eye test and a pair of glasses – can boost a child's lifetime earnings by up to 78%. That's not just a health benefit, but a social and economic game-changer.

Here in Burwood and around, local residents can take small but powerful steps to join this global movement:

- Book an eye check-up for yourself and your family.
- Share eye health resources online.
- Support organisations working to bring eye care to vulnerable communities. Join the movement towards a brighter future for vision care. https:// www.iapb.world/world_sight_day

World Sight Day also reminds us to look out for our children. The rise in screen time, indoor lifestyles, and overlooked symptoms of poor vision are contributing to early eye strain and undiagnosed issues. Awareness today could mean opportunity tomorrow.

Glaucoma remains one of the leading causes of irreversible sight loss and is usually without symptoms. It is important to see your eye health professional for screening, even if there is no family history of it – if we catch the disease early we can help maintain good functional vision for life. It is important to note that while treatment can prevent vision loss, it cannot restore sight already lost to glaucoma, which is why early detection is so important.

Let's ensure no one is left behind in the dark. This October, love your eyes, and help someone else love theirs too.

The interim Vicar at the time, the Rev. Anne Kennedy, blessed and dedicated the windows on Sunday 3 December 2023, with many family members and friends joining the congregation for the occasion. Geoffrey Wallace, a specialist in new stained glass, who designed and created these windows, also attended.


Each design contains motifs that are relevant to the people in whose memory the windows are dedicated: Baptism, Music, and Madonna & Child; the fourth window is a tribute to St Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of animals, after whom the Chapel is named.


The late Dr Sophia Errey (a much loved and respected, longtime parishioner), spent much time in consultation with each of the families, and with Geoffrey Wallace, to create the relevant designs for the windows; they are a wonderful memorial and a spectacular addition to the Church building.

Lewis, his wife Carole (also an accomplished musician and singing teacher), and their young family, arrived at St Peter's in the mid-1980s, where he commenced playing the organ, initially in a part-time position, as organist for Evensong, and on other occasions when required. By 1987, Lewis was appointed full-time organist and choir master, marking the beginning of over 35 years of dedication to providing a high standard of music and singing at St. Peter's. Outside of St Peter's, Lewis was

a passionate Director of Music at Mentone Grammar (1982 to 2008), touching the lives of many students





A New Community Space

St Paul's Lutheran Church

If you've driven near the intersection of Riversdale Road and Station Street, Box Hill South, in the past few years, you've probably noticed a large building rising next to the former St James Uniting Church. It's been a significant project for the Lutheran congregation, who bought this site in 2018 and have now relocated from their former home at 711 Station Street in the heart of Box Hill.


For some years, the members of St Paul's watched as the area around them was sold and redeveloped at a great pace. Access to their church, which they built in 1953-54, was becoming difficult, and parking almost impossible – especially during the week. They pursued several options; but then came a 'God-moment' for them. St James Uniting Church in Riversdale Road was for sale, and the site included a carpark across the road. The purchase was finalised in October 2018, after a very successful sale of their property in Station Street.


It has been a project of love to restore this church because it has a heritage overlay, due to its notable early modernist, mid-century architecture, designed by the prominent architect David Chancellor. The exterior of the church needed to be retained in its entirety, but an exemption was granted by Whitehorse Council for the front entry. The interior was extensively renovated and is now an inspiring worship home that will serve the congregation well for many years ahead. The church was re-dedicated in 2020.

of the Lutheran Church of Australia, Victoria and Tasmania District. Therefore, St Paul's Centre was born, with planning for the imposing extension commencing soon after purchase. This was interrupted during the Covid years, and there was an explosion in building costs. The congregation engaged the same architectural firm used for the church renovation, Law Architects, who have done fine work in extending the church space into large community and office areas – all the time preserving the integrity of the original church design, including its façade.

The new St Paul's Centre is now open for all neighbours and interested people to inspect, and to enjoy the hospitality of the congregation as thanks for their patience during construction. It will be formally dedicated mid-September, but members are already enjoying the space and warmth of their new home. Do come and visit and see for yourselves what is a special and welcoming space.

THE lure of the legendary CWA breakfast has my husband and I depart Hawthorn early for the Melbourne Showgrounds. We travel to Flinders Street by tram, then onto the Flemington Racecourse branch line to arrive by 8.30am.

Our timeliness pays off as we secure the last vacant table, and each order a full serving of bacon and eggs with the lot. All washed down with a hot cuppa – to warm us before we venture into the chilly air. The country ladies have done themselves proud!

The Hall of Manufacturers is our first stop to view the entire offering of show bags, though not purchased until we wend our way home. There's a huge selection; way above the Bertie Beetle and Darrell Lea bags I remember from my childhood. Another recollection from days gone by is the terrifying, but never attempted, Mad Mouse ride. It's still in place but avoided – as are all the rides. David and I are here essentially for the animals.


The sheep dog herding of long-necked ducks attracts our attention. So funny to see the charming birds fall into a tight flock and scamper as the border collie moves swiftly to and fro behind them. The nearby wood chop draws us in as we both marvel at the strength and courage of the men, as they chop their way up large poles. Or strike at blocks with razor-sharp axes, while straddling them dressed all in white with flimsy Dunlop Volleys. A loud applause rings out from the enthralled audience as the axemen complete their tasks.

Next is the caged prize hens and roosters – one of David's favourite displays. So many varieties lying calmly and quietly as we push our faces closer to appraise them. David coos to them, murmuring how beautiful they all look. The dressage arena nearby is of particular interest to me, as I have a lifelong love of horses. The turnout of rider and mount is perfect. The highly educated beasts move across the space with an extended trot, or treading on the spot with the *piaffe* movement. We feel very privileged to view this particular kind of excellence.

The cattle pavilion, though, is my absolute first preference. It comprises a large shed of cows and bulls of all the domestic breeds – Friesian, Jersey, Aberdeen Angus. There is a special ambience between all the stock as they lie or stand, contentedly chewing their cud. All washed and groomed. No unpleasant odours of your average cowshed. Rather, there is a sweet smell of hay that adds to this gentle bovine pastoral.

After collecting show bags for family, we retreat home by mid-afternoon, again via public transport. The day has been a real immersion into farming life. And a true distraction from the metropolis – as we both enjoy all that regional Victoria has to offer. The cake and sewing displays will just have to wait for another year!

7OULD you let your child consume 16 teaspoons of sugar in one sitting? That's the reality behind a single 600 mL bottle of soft drink, and it's something of which many Australian families may be unaware. The Australian Medical Association (AMA) has launched a campaign called

"Sickly Sweet" to raise awareness of the health risks posed by sugary drinks, particularly for children and teenagers.

Sugary drinks are a major contributor to tooth decay, obesity and chronic conditions like Type 2 diabetes – illnesses that are increasingly affecting younger Australians. According to the AMA, children aged 9 to 13 consume an average of 14–16 teaspoons of added sugar per day, much of it from soft drinks, sports drinks and flavoured waters.

In Burwood and neighbouring suburbs, the issue is no different. Sugary drinks are widely available and heavily marketed – especially around schools and sports venues. Local health professionals agree: reducing sugary drink consumption is one of the simplest ways to improve children's long-term health.

The AMA is calling for stronger policy action, including mandatory warning labels, tighter controls on marketing aimed at young people, and reduced availability of sugary drinks in schools and public facilities. These measures have been successfully introduced in other countries, and the AMA believes it's time Australia followed suit.

A short explainer released as part of the campaign shows just how quickly sugar adds up through popular drinks. The visuals are eye-opening and perfect for sharing on social media.

Locally, there are practical steps we can take. Parents can encourage water or unsweetened milk as the default drink option. Schools and community centres can review what's offered in canteens and vending machines. Councils can support policies that limit sugary drink advertising near schools and playgrounds.

As AMA President Professor Steve Robson puts it: "Sugary drinks are a gateway to a lifetime of chronic illness. We need to protect our kids from these preventable harms".

Op-Shop Trails Op shopping in Ashwood

GIVEN the proximity, I often check out the op shops in Ashwood when I'm in Ashburton (see issue 172). There are two op shops in Ashwood: a Vinnies and the somewhat confusingly named Salvation Army Thrift Shop Ashburton. Let's start with the latter.

Despite its name, the Salvation Army Thrift Shop Ashburton is located in the Ashwood shopping precinct (401-403 High Street, Ashburton). It bears the same red shield that's synonymous with the Salvation Army and indeed it's emblazoned on the exterior of the building. But, as I found out, it is not technically part of the typical Salvos op shops that you see around town. This particular shop is a *thrift shop*, which is distinct from the Salvo's *op shop* stores. I'm not sure what the difference is (apart from the name), but I can tell you that the Salvo's op shop loyalty card is not accepted at this thrift shop.

No matter – treasure is still treasure by any other name. This thrift shop has plenty of goods to fossick through. On its doorstep, there are racks of clothing and shoes going for only a dollar or two. Inside, there is a decent selection of higher-end clothing and shoes, jewellery and homewares.

Just 150 metres around the corner from the thrift shop is Vinnies (386 Warrigal Road, Ashburton). As with all Vinnies op shops, this is neatly presented and I particularly like the selection of manchester in this shop.



We're on the air!

IN June, the *Burwood Bulletin* found itself on air with Peter Cassidy's Breakfast Program on 94.1FM 3WBC.

The partnership between our two community media organisations goes back about 10 years, when 94.1FM used to have a column in the Bulletin and one of their presenters, Catherine Chadwick, was a Bulletin contributor.

All of the presenters on 94.1FM are all-around extraordinaires, as they produce and present the shows themselves. There's no other technical or supporting person helping out them out while the show is on air.

Peter has been with 94.1FM for 30 years and presents the Tuesday Breakfast Program and the Easy Listening Saturday Afternoon Program, which is one of the longest-running, live-to-air programs on this station and possibly the wider community.

Peter invited us along to share with his listeners about the great stories and community information we have in the Bulletin. As part of this, we took the opportunity to take a step back in time to relive the genesis of the magazine.

In 1979, a seminar on the causes of unemployment was organised by local churches and sports clubs. Arising from this, it became evident that because Burwood residents are divided by two major roads and are on the boundaries of four municipalities (Box Hill, Camberwell, Nunawading and Waverley) there was a fragmented community identity. It was decided that a local publication publication providing information on local services and events would help foster a sense of shared identity.

To get the publication started, the Box Hill Council gave a \$100 grant, along with \$20 each from the Burwood Unity Church and the Burwood Regional Educational Community Centre. The Community Centre also offered the use of a typewriter and offset print services at low cost.

The first issue of the *Burwood Bulletin* was published in November 1980 and was well received by the community. The early issues were a simple affair – six pages of A4 paper stapled together, embellished by hand for hard-to-reproduce items (such as the \pounds sign) and simple illustrations.

The first issue also sought donations and sponsors to fund the following issue. Back then, it cost one cent per page to produce the *Burwood Bulletin*, which meant the team could only print 1,500 copies (compared to a print-run of 5,000 copies in 2025). For those of you keen to have a closer look, early issues can be found on our website.

The heart of the Bulletin was a list of local services and events (such as theatre productions, council and church services, local Justices of the Peace, etc). This has been kept up throughout the 45 years of the Bulletin and will continue to do so. As interest in the Bulletin grew, stories of local interest were incorporated.

The magazine has always been made possible by volunteers lending their time and skills. Our current team is made of people mostly living in the Burwood area, with some having volunteered for many years. We are always on the lookout for new members to help us continue the work – whether writing stories, delivering the magazines to our drop-off points, or helping us source more advertisers. We work remotely and come together for meetings each quarter.

If you're a reader, we'd be interested to hear about your current musings or recollections of local life. Likewise, if you're a business or community group, do share with us your achievements and upcoming events.

Support our supporters and tune in to 94.1FM or pop into the Box Hill Town Hall Hub on Whitehorse Road, where you can see Peter broadcast live in his studio with the big window.

Hands-On Learning at Nettleton Park

WHAT began as a simple request from the Boroondara Volunteer Resource Centre soon blossomed into a powerful exchange between cultures, generations, and communities.

Earlier this year, a group of 25-30 adult students from the Swinburne Adult Migrant English Program (AMEP), based at Swinburne University in Hawthorn, visited Nettleton Park in Glen Iris. The students - many of whom have journeyed halfway across the world from China, Peru, Iran, Greece, India, Afghanistan and Sri Lanka – came for more than a day in the park. They came for connection, learning, and contribution.

The idea was sparked by AMEP teacher Asha Prakash, who wanted her students to experience volunteering in a meaningful, hands-on way. The chosen site, Nettleton Park, is cared for by the Back2Nettleton Friends Group – a local community group dedicated to environmental restoration since the end of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"At first, the idea of welcoming so many students at once seemed overwhelming," said a group organiser. "But I remembered my mother's advice: 'Don't look a gift horse in the mouth.' It turned out to be a gift, indeed."

To manage the visit, students were split into smaller rotating groups and took part in a guided nature walk, weeding, mulching and preparing garden beds for planting. Along the way, they learned new English words like "flora", "fauna", and "biodiversity", and even discovered that the park is home to Tawny Frogmouths - an encounter that sparked curiosity and a flurry of smartphone searches.

The day was such a success that AMEP later described it as the most highly rated student activity of the year. The partnership continued to grow. More classes joined, and the activities expanded to include Clean Up Australia Day, Water Watch testing, bug counts, planting, and even inspecting nesting hollows for yellow-tailed black cockatoos.

When the group marked its fourth birthday in March, the celebration included local councillors, state MP Matt Fregon, council staff, and members of the public. Students mingled, shared ideas, and enjoyed a well-earned birthday

"The program is a win-win," said Antony Braakhuis, a work scheduler with the group. "The students practice English, experience Australian culture, and contribute to real environmental work. We benefit from their help and energy, and they become potential volunteers for the future - wherever they may settle."

For AMEP teacher Asha Prakash, the program holds special meaning. A migrant herself, Asha transitioned from a corporate career in Dubai to retraining as a teacher in Australia. Her own story helps her guide others navigating the challenges of migration and settlement.

The problem of fleas

LEA infestations are often thought of as a spring/summer problem and can sometimes result in relaxed flea preventative measures during the winter months. Unfortunately, flea infestations can potentially occur all-year-round, regardless of season. Carpets, rugs and other soft furnishings, pets residing in the home, coupled with central heating provide these little critters the perfect breeding ground. Therefore, regular treatment can help prevent flea population surges during spring.

I treated my dog for fleas a couple of weeks ago so why am I still seeing fleas?

Flea infestations, depending on the severity can take up to 8-12 weeks to clear! Treatment requires the regular, correct delivery of a registered flea product applied at a frequency recommended by the manufacturer. The key to understanding why things don't always go to plan requires a basic understanding of the flea lifecycle.



The adult flea, an insect you can see with the naked eye, makes up only 5% of the total flea population. The remaining 95% of the population comprise eggs, larvae and pupae that can be found (but not seen) in your pet's environment. Adult fleas live, breed and feed on your pet – a single female flea can produce up to 50 eggs a day and live for up to 100 days, so populations can escalate quickly! It takes on average 21 days for an adult flea to develop from the egg. Fleas prefer warm, moist weather, which is why they tend to be more noticeable in the warmer months. The juvenile life stages can remain dormant for at least six months; hence, the recommendation for year-round treatment.

If a regular preventative flea treatment has not been appropriately applied, the fleas you are seeing may well be the dormant juvenile environmental stages hatching out because of the warmer weather. Flea products work by targeting one or more stages of the flea lifecycle, leading to the reduction and eventual elimination of the household population. Continued application of your current flea product will, in time, eliminate the adults and the environmental 95%.

It is vital to treat all the animals in the household... including the cat! This removes any "reservoir hosts". Splitting doses is not recommended, as this can reduce treatment efficacy.

Can humans get fleas from pets?

No. They prefer the thinner skin of dogs and cats; but they may bite around the ankles in the case of a heavy infestation.

Animal fact:

Fleas can jump 20cm into the air – that's 150 times their own height!

The Power

The story of local

It isn't all that difficult to work out how many doctors or solicitors are in your town or suburb, but it's far more difficult to find writers or artists who share your neighbourhood. So I wouldn't have discovered the painter Harry Frencken if it hadn't been for the fact that some of Harry's charming watercolour paintings had been hung on a wall at the Ashburton Senior Citizens' Centre some years ago.

An accomplished artist – although he is also a skilled woodworker, as well as, by training back in his native Netherlands, a plumber and even a motor mechanic - Harry has been living in Ashburton since 1964, and painting all over Victoria after first arriving as an 'assisted migrant' in Sydney in 1954. Even as a child he loved to sketch and make pencil drawings of the rural surroundings of his hometown of Roermond, a beautiful historic town in the Limburg district of the Netherlands on the banks or the river Roer, a tributary of the Meuse, which the Dutch call the Maas. Roermond is merely three kilometres from the German border, and seven kilometres from the border with Belgium. For several years after his arrival in Australia Harry worked in South Australia, where he got married. He moved to Melbourne in 1957. Here he and his wife Dot designed and built their home at Ashburton. It was not until the nineteen-sixties that Harry returned to his childhood hobby of painting after joining a YMCA group in Mount Waverley.

Some of Harry's early works were painted in oils, but he later turned to watercolour as his preferred medium.




You need to have some talent to use watercolour, and Harry has plenty of that. With oils you can make corrections but with watercolour every move is final; you can't change it if you make a mistake. Although he has also painted portraits and still lifes, ever since childhood he had a special love for landscapes.

After retiring from his 'paid job' many years ago and now a 'senior citizen' and widowed from his beloved wife of 63 years, he very rarely paints these days. And the happy days of going on long painting hikes to the hills beyond Healesville or Gippsland with his fellow artists from the Box Hill Art Group are now a thing of the past. The Box Hill Group had been a significant part of Harry's life. He was a member for many years and is now a Life Member. He regularly participated in its group exhibitions, and was awarded a number of prizes. He acknowledges that several of the Group's members exerted a major influence on his art. He particularly names well-known watercolour artists Arthur Markham and Herman Pekel. Prior to joining the Box Hill group, in 1974 Harry founded his own art group, the Black Flat Painters at Mount Waverley.

Beside the Box Hill art shows, over the years Harry has exhibited his work at the Camberwell Art Show, Box Hill Town Hall, the Mildura Art Gallery and various other art venues. Some of his work has even been taken to Europe and Japan.




a new service continues the tradition of care

THE community support facility on the corner of Burwood Highway and Blackburn Road in East Burwood has been known by several names during the 52 years of its operation. The most recent title was "Uniting East Burwood". Uniting VicTas has now withdrawn from the site, and as a response the congregation of Burwood Heights Uniting Church has launched a new outreach service – East Burwood Care.

The name aptly describes the ongoing commitment to caring for the community. The unique logo depicts all people, young or old, any race or colour and the figure's arm reaches outside the square, suggesting that taking the risk to seek assistance is not an easy thing to do.

In 2025 a focus on material aid has become increasingly necessary in many agencies, with resources stretched in the provision of food assistance. Regular contributions for the twin needs – food and finance – have always been maintained by individuals, organisations and churches, and it is hoped that East Burwood Care will continue to benefit from that generosity. We are thankful for the support already received since the new service opened.

Volunteers are considered to be a valuable asset in any society and the work at East Burwood Care depends entirely on its volunteers, in a variety of roles – sourcing supplies, organising in-house or fundraising at a barbecue. One vital task undertaken by trained Community Workers is to offer the much-needed attention to each person who comes for help. They hear the stories of life's challenges, some of them a first experience of severe economic hardship. Sustained by the encouragement of the wider community, our volunteers are there to offer support in a journey towards hope.

HUSBANDS AND WIVES.

I have been thinking over a talk I had the other day with a woman of forty-three (says Janet Wise). She is still pretty. She has three children, the youngest being twelve.

We were discussing husbands - not complaining about them! My friend has had twenty very happy years of marriage and she attributes it to the fact that she has put her husband's interests before her children's.

"I determined that children should not tie me down," she said. "I adored the babies, but I reckoned that, in the long run, my husband's companionship and confidence were most important. They continue after children have found other interests, don't they?

"Pampering the children would have meant giving up many of the things I shared with him. So I didn't pamper them. People called it selfish. I called it teaching them unselfishness and self-reliance.

"When I tell them I am going out with their father they never complain. They enjoy the little treats they have, in compensation. I tell them to have what they like for tea, or perhaps, to invite their friends. Really, I believe they have the greatest fun when we're or away, and they appreciate our company far more when we are there. Anyway, they seem happy enough."

And I know what my friend says is true. I've seen her children for myself, and happier youngsters would be hard to find. Moreover, they rejoice in a young and companionable mother.

It makes you wonder if the average woman sacrifices too much for her children, does it not?

HEN we built our first home we were invited to have tea and scones with the old lady next door. She was without doubt the most untidy, dirty, old lady I had ever seen. Her finger nails were deeply imbedded with a mixture of flour and mud. She wore dreadful old high-heeled cast-off shoes, usually odd, always coated with mud. Always she wore a wide-brimmed hat, and struggled to wear a very strong pair of glasses, which were always falling from her nose.

Inside the house was the most appalling smell of dogs. Two great, strong rascals guarded the doors of this old lady's domain, and you were friend indeed if you could get past those dogs.

Overcome with the stench, the dirt and everything I, in my pregnant state, vowed that it was not a friendship I would encourage.

However, how soon were my ideas to change! As we got to know this old battler, we grew to love her. Brought up on the smell of a meal in the Mallee, she used to say to me, "Jenny, it's only hot when the birds fall out of the trees, dead". What hardships she must have suffered. Her husband was an alcoholic known at every pub between Kew and Ferntree Gully. He always had plenty of mates, particularly after they won £110,000 in Tatts. "What did they do with the money?" you ask. The first thing they did was pay for loads of broken tiles to make the mud track that was their road negotiable. Then they bought a car. As neither Mr. or Mrs Bereton drove (Mr. Bereton having lost half an arm in the war) they were unable to drive themselves.

Mr Bereton's familiar figure rolling along the road, singing at the top of his voice with the accompaniment of his precious dogs was a sight. His shopping bag fitted very neatly just below the elbow where the arm had been severed. Because of his rolling gait he had been christened "Wingy Bereton".

Having bought the car, the couple relied on friends and neighbours to take them out, and many were the adventurous drives home from the pub, with good friends and true on board! They bought an electric sewing machine – which they never learnt to use – a Mixmaster, and a television set. As the house had no bathroom we suggested a bath might be a good idea. But "No, dear, them things is no good for my back" was the quick reply.

We grew to love this brave old lady, who, though she was albino and could hardly see, lived life to the full.

Story of a Special Someone

She was always up at five, working in her huge garden, cutting the long grass with a bread knife. All the money in the world could not change her. What if the chooks did venture inside the back door? If she did see them she just shooed them out, and after a while the smells of the house went unnoticed. It was she who taught me how to make the best scones in the world, how to make jam and cakes

And when our little babies arrived, she was fascinated. Never having anything to do with children before, she spoke to them like the dogs, patting them and calling them. What a wonderful sense of humour she had, and such fun we all experienced together.

Every Sunday morning, left on our front step would be a batch of scones, a jam tart, and a cake or two. What if our guests, while eating their fruit-cake, did find a mouthful of newspaper, used as the tin lining? "Improves the flavour", we'd say.

One day the old dear, unable to see a swarm of bees ahead of her, walked right into them. Her long fair hair, which she swore had never seen peroxide, was a mass of angry swarming stinging bees. A short stay in hospital ensued, and then she was up and about again, her familiar stooped, reed-like figure complete with wide brimmed hat and ever-faithful dogs by her side.

She was wonderful at crochet. During the great depression she crocheted baby clothes to keep from starving, and all our neighbours had to do their homework or Mrs Bereton was in to see why not. We all learned to crochet very well while having innumerable cups of tea.


She never paid a doctor's bill in her life. Instead she kept him in scones and jam. He loved her too, just as we all did. "Eat plenty of onions", she said, "And you'll live to be a hundred".

Then one day we heard the dogs howling inside the house, and there she was, as if asleep, in the hall. She had been making a cake, and feeling unwell, got as far as the hall, where she died. Those dogs howled for three days. I think I did too.

I shall never forget that funeral.

Anyone who was anyone and everyone was there. And the flowers!

She would have loved to have seen them herself. It would have greatly amused her.

A seed bomb does exactly what it says on the packet – it disperses seeds when thrown onto the ground. These are little balls usually made with clay with some compost and wildflower seeds rolled into it. They offer a fast way to vegetate difficult to access areas, as well as an easy way for gardeners to sow seeds without bending down.

Seed bombs are often used by guerrilla gardeners to green up an otherwise barren public space. The intentions of guerrilla gardening are well meaning, but before "bombs-awaying", please ensure the seed bombs are not sown without consent on private property and that the seeds chosen are not invasive to the area.

With that caveat, seed bombs are a fun DIY activity to do with kids, and they also make thoughtful handmade gifts.

There are plenty of seed bomb recipes on line. Here is a basic seed bomb recipe:

- 1 cup of wildflower seeds (Cosmos, Queen Anne's Lace, Love-In-A-Mist all work well in Melbourne's climate)
- 5 cups of peat-free compost (vermicompost from the worm bin works well)
- 2–3 cups of powdered clay (from art supplies shop)
- Water

Mix all the ingredients except for the water in a large bowl. Slowly add small quantities of water until the mixture turns into a paste that is firm but sticks together. Using your hands, roll the mixture into small balls the size of marbles. Leave them to dry in the sun. Once dried, these seed bombs are ready to be deployed.

View from the

IN 1953, Merle and Keith Williams purchased a block of land, in one of Camberwell's last-to-be-sub-divided allotments, on the corner of Clitus Avenue. and Madeline Street, Burwood (today renamed Glen Iris). It was an elevated block with magnificent views to the south and to the west, where Malvern Town Hall could be seen.

They chose a Burwood builder, Ken Emmett to build their dream home. Ken looked at the preliminary plan and suggested, due to the panoramic views, that the kitchen be moved to the south side of the home (in the 1930s and 40s the kitchen was usually positioned in the middle of the house).

This decision, due to its elevated position, gave Merle, who was a stay-at-home kitchen goddess, an unsurpassed view of the world as she went about her activities. The kitchen was Merle's playground, Merle's happy place. Her kitchen was a palette of blue. Pale blue cupboard surrounds, dark blue cupboard doors and the bench tops in a similar material to Laminex, dark blue marbled Formica.

Merle spent hours every week baking. She delighted in concentrating on the sensory pleasures of mixing sugar into soft butter, folding melted chocolate into a variety of mixtures and hand mixing coconut or choc pieces into biscuit mix. Merle was known and respected for her vanilla slices, lemon filled sponges, powder puffs, Neenish tarts and raspberry and cream matches. With five males (four boys and a husband) to feed, she had 94 pieces of cake or slice in her steel-lined cake cupboard each Monday morning.


